A tribute to the Late J.W. Mills

On November 28, 1896 James William Mills, oldest son of Robert Mills and his wife, Mary Spindloe was born in Ormstown. He spent most of his life in this town, absent only for his service in the Canadian Army 1914 to 1918 and his student years at McGill University.

He was a dentist, widely known for the excellence of his workmanship. He practised for 57 years in this place, where he was known at home and revered abroad. "Doc" Mills, as he was

familiarly known, was a kind man. He had a host of relatives as his parents, his brother and sisters, sisterin-law and brothers-in-law had all pre-deceased him.

He joined the United Church of Canada in Ormstown before he went overseas at age of 17. He was an avid curier and member of the Ormstown Curling Club.

But he is best remembered for his great interest in people - and for his being superb story teller.

Doctor Mills never married. When he was well over 80 he gave up his practice and sold his home. During the remaining few years of his life he lived with Mr. and Mrs. Allan Mack whom he called his "foster parents". On February 13, 1986 he

died quietly in his sleep at their home.

A life-long friend of Dr. J.W. Mills thinks these lines, written years ago, commemorating the death of a famous General, are appropriate. "All is over and done

Render thanks to the Giver (Ormstown) for thy son".

On November 28, 1985 Dr. Mills' "foster parents" had surprised him with a birthday party at Walshaven Residence. The following poem composed by Mr. Mack was read on that occasion:

To James William Mills We speak to-night of many things

That happened years ago Which many do not recollect But friends have told them so. To happy parents in this town

Was born a bouncing boy. He was one of children four And became their pride and He grew and grew and grew As happy children will.
