The Late Aylmer Hadley

Aylmer Hadley, a life long resident of Hemmingford, passed away at the Royal Victoria Hospital on Friday, July 11, 1986. He was in his 78th year. Although not enjoying the best of health for the past three or four years, his death came as quite a shock to his family and friends.

Besides his wife, Evelyn, he leaves to mourn his passing six children, Donald and Wayne of Hemmingford, Alice of Cornwall, Ont., Elsie of Clarenceville, Myrne of London, Ont. and Debbie of Cadiac, twelve grandchildren and one great grand child, one brother Robert of Hemmingford, and a sister Edna Marshall of Grand Bend, Ont.

On October 30, 1933, Aylmer was married to Evelyn Cookman. They bought a home just east of

the village of Hemmingford. In 1941 they sold this property and built a new home on the farm that they had purchased from the late Arthur Marlin, where they had lived ever since.

In October 1983, Mr. and Mrs Hadley were honoured by their family at a 50 Anniversary Party at the Hemmingford Golf and Country Club.

Aylmer served on the Township Council as a councillor for a number of years, but, due to ill health, he resigned and his son Donald was elected to replace him. He served as a school commissioner and drove a school bus for over 20 years for the local school. He was a director of the Havelock Fair Board and secretary-treasurer for 37 years. He always took a great interest in both municipal and government affairs.

Aylmer was a past master of Hemmingford Lodge No. 72 A.F. and A.M. and a past patron of Victory Chapter No. 34, Order of the Eastern Star. At the time of this death he was Grand Representative to the state of North Carolina.

About 16 years ago he sold his farm to his youngest son Wayne, reserving about eight acres of orchard. He was a keen orchardist and each year had one of the cleanest orchards in Hemmingford.

The body rested at Sharpe's Funeral Home and services were held from St. Luke's Anglican Church on Monday July 14 with the Rev. Glenn Eason officiating. He was laid to rest in the Hemmingford Protestant Cemetery.
