Marjory Templeton, 95, dies in Centre d'accueil

Marjory Templeton, in her 95th year, passed away at the Centre d'Accueil, Ormstown, on February 24, 1987.

Mrs. Templeton, a gentle, kind lady, was a long-time resident of the Scotch Concession, Riverfield. Her foremost interest throughout her life was her family to whom she was devoted.

Marjory Young Thompson was born November 2, 1892 on the Mississquoi Bay Shore Road, Clarenceville. She was the second daughter of Robert Thompson and Annie Young.

Her early years of schooling were in Clarenceville and Hemmingford. In 1910, she continued her education by attending the Macdonald, College school for Teachers. After graduation she taught in a one-room school in Hemmingford for four years.

During her college days, she had visited the home of classmate May Templeton of Riverfield, meeting May's older brother Wallace who became her future husband.

Wallace and Marjory were married September 15, 1915 in Port Mills, Vermont where her

parents were living at the time. After honeymooning in Boston, the newlyweds settled in the stone house on "The Scotch." Built in 1846 and newly redecorated for the young couple, it was on the farm settled by the Templeton pioneers from Scotland who had emigrated to Canada in 1829.

With the values of church and home at the core of their lives, Wallace and Marjory raised five sons and two daughters on their farm home. Devoted to family life, they were always interested in the welfare of their children. This interest continued, extending to the next generations.

During their retirement years the Templetons continued (except for two years) to live on "The Scotch," moving to another home where Marjory remained for some years after her husband's death.

Following hospitalization and convalescence at the Henshaw Home, the last nine years of her life were spent at Centre d'Accueil. Here Mrs. Templeton kept a cheerful spirit looking forward to a daily visit from someone in her family. Her wonderful outlook and loving manner

were an inspiration to those who came in contact with her.

Funeral services were held February 27, in Howick United Church where Mrs. Templeton had been a charter member. In conducting the service, Rev. Cogswell paid tribute to her by telling how she had made her life from the situation around her. A joint choir, with Joyce McKell as organist, led in the singing of "Come Let us Sing of a Wonderful Love" and "Breathe on me Breath of God." The pallbearers were four grandsons - Alec Templeton, Ralph Templeton, Mark Templeton, and Brian MacFarlane. Interment will be in Riverfield Cemetery in the spring.

Marjory Templeton was predeceased by her husband, James Wallace Templeton, in 1966, her eldest son, James in 1986; a grandson, Lorne Templeton in 1965 and a sister Hazel Cameron in 1978. She is survived by her children Douglas, Donald, Earle, Betty (Mrs. Brodie MacFarlane), Murray and Jean (Mrs. Nick Furcall), also 17 grandchildren, 18 great-grandchildren and brother Grant Thompson.
