# The late J. Archie Roy On March 25, 1988, citizens tauner, who for many years

of the Howick area bade farewell to one of its lifelong members in the person of John Archie Roy who died in the Montreal General Hospital from heart ailments.

Archie Roy was born on

May May 18, 1916 Balquhidder Farm, 1916 at home of his parents and grandparents. The farm was in the Roy name for three generations: 1861 1982. Here he promoted, and excelled in, the art of farming; and in particular, the development of outstanding Ayrshire cattle. One of his most rewarding achievements was the export of a calf, export Balquhidder Maple Sugar, to Jim Lawrie in Scotland. Archie's interest in cattle

started at an early age; for he, along with several of his friends, belonged to the Howick Ayrshire Calf Club formed in 1932. Archie was its first President and always a supporter of the Club which later became the Howick 4H Club. Many youngsters appreciated and benefited from his guidance during his years as leader and director.

Further afield, he was an enthusiastic member and Secretary of the Howick-Huntingdon Ayrshire Club; Director and President (1968) of the Ayrshire Breeders' Association of Canada, and judged many

Archie Roy enjoyed a

wide circle of friends, and they in turn enjoyed him. He will long be remembered for his sense of humor and an unsurpassed talent for storytelling, which spilled over into playacting when the Howick Y.P.U. staged their annual productions His yarn spinning was a treat to friends and associates of all ages. With wide and deep interests in farming, his church, local history and curting, John Archie Roy accomplished much for his community.

He is survived by his wife Helen Muir Roy, and daughters Beth of Toronto, and Heather of Howick, and his state to the Nish.
