Ella Margaret McCrae Young Mack would have chuckled merrily at the suggestion that she had been a trail-blazer in the filed of education. But that's just what the late wife of Allan Mack of Ormstown was.

The lady with the laughing eyes was a mere slip of a Bonaventure County lass when, after gaining her Matriculation Certificate at New Carlisle High School in 1925 at the age of seventeen, she organized the first Junior Red Cross group in the elementary school of hernative Oak Point. This was just before she took on her first teaching assignment, grades one through seven in the oneroom school on the Kempt Road in Broadlands in the municipality of Restigouche. But that was just the beginning!

After she secured her First Class Intermediate (Model) Diploma from MacDonald College School for Teachers in 1927, she took on the principalship of the Intermediate School at Sunny Bank in Gaspé County, teaching grades four through nine, and looking for new trails to blaze. She found one! It's difficult to visualize "Rae" (as she was known to those closest to her) as the organizer of a school's first football squad, but that's just what she became in Sunny Bank! Quite a venture for a girl in the nineteen twenties.

When Miss Young subsequently took charge of the thirty elementary pupils in New richmond No. 2 School, she brought in yet another innovation when she set up on her own initiative a hot lunch program for the winter months, providing soup or cocoa, Another "first," carried out by the pupils and theirinnovative teacher. That year (1929-1939) she received bonuses for successful teaching from both the Department of Education and her School Board. Small wonder! The perceptive young teacher obviously

South-West Quebec was the next region of the Province of Quebec to benefit from Miss Young's enthusiasm, skill and resourcefulness. In 1930 she became Principal of Athelstan Intermediate School, teaching grades six through nine. She organized that school's first softball team, and became a rural teacher's representative for the off-island teachers at the convention of the Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers. She later assumed the principalship of Dundee Consolidated School; her hot-lunch program there was as popular as her earlier venture had been in New Richmond.

Miss Young, as she still was, with Mr. J.B. MacMillan, Principal of Huntingdon Academy, organized around that time the first teachers' association in the county, and she became the second president of what later became the Châteauguay Valley Teachers' Association.

Following two years as Principal of Escuminae Consolidated Intermediate School, in which she taught grades eight, nine and ten, Ella Margaret McCrae Young; in July 1935, married Allan Arthur Mack, and subsequently became the mother of three children, Jean, Robert and Ruth. By 1939, youngster in Elgin, then Port Daniel and Athelstan, were once again benefitting from the many gifts that Mrs. Mack delighted in sharing. She went to Huntingdon Academy in 1946, and during the next eight years both elementary and high school students in that town got to know and value this dynamic teacher. Eleven and a half years in Sherbrooke High School followed, during which she taught people in Grades seven and eight, was chairman of the Program Committee of the Sherbrooke
