"Like many of you here, I have known George most of my life. We have worked together here in the church, in the fire department, and in the community as a which I found him always to be mild-mannered and even tempered, never complaining and ever optimistic, no matter what the situation was.

He was a most sincere, fair, hardworking man, and an excellent provider for his wife and family as long as his health permitted, and on Tuesday afternoon when God called him Home, George was busy in his workshop, doing what he

loved-working with wood.

George received his education at several country schools, but I'm sure Margaret will agree that his greatest learning experiences were in the Powerscourt school, when it became their home when they were married on June 1957.

Like so many farm boys, George worked with his Dad on the family farm, which he continued to run-all of his life. His first off-the-farm job was working at the Cooperage, here Athelstan, and then at the Athelstan Sash & Door factory, betterknow as Racine's where he was employed for 13 years. In 1966 George became self-employed as a carpenter with his own woodworking shop and had since been kept busy fixing and building throughout the

valley.

George loved his church and was a lifetime member of this congregation, to which he gave his full support; had been an elder for 29 years and also served in the board of managers for many terms.

Before the local fire department was organized, anyone needing help in the form of manpower would call Racine and the men would leave their jobs to give a helping hand, so in that way George was a volunteer fireman before the fire department was actually formed. George was a keen fireman, answering calls quickly and cheerfully, no matter what the time or circumstance. Following his first heart attack in 1975 he regretfully resigned from active duty, but continued his interest, helping the

firemen whenever possible.

Having endured the ills of diabetes since the age of 13, his faith and love of life kept him strong, and during those recent months, when he lost his leg because of this disease, he never lost his sense of humor. He told everyone that he got twice the wear out of a pair of socks, and not every wife got asked "Go

get my other leg, please."

His love for his family was very evident, and he was often heard talking about some accomplishment of Margaret's or one of his, children.

Danny, Nancy, you can be comforted knowing that your Dad was a gentle, loving man, caring for the wonders of nature in God's world, taking joy in little facons with their mothers, birds in a nest

or just the beauty of a day.

Margaret — happy

loved one, and I know that
you have a heartfull of wonderful, loving memories of
George, and when you are
having a bad day, remember
his philosophy, keep your
chin up and think positive.
