world at the center of Hemmingford Village, in the Scriver Block. Somerville's first book, "Hemmingford Then and Now," a 12-page chapter recounts the author's own life. Editor Leigh Boyle Coffin introduces the chapter: "It is somehow appropriate that he was born at this location, for he has spent a lifetime at the centre of things in native village, occupying

such varied offices as Mayor

of the Village of the Town-

ship, Chairman of the School

Board..." Coffin refers to

him as "Mr. Hemmingford." Alister Somerville's own recollections of his upbringing in this small village make up the bulk of the chapter and are a pleasure to read. As a youngster he once dug a snow well into a huge snowdrift(typical of that era) and found that he had almost dug his own grave when he tried to climb out. His father, the banker, eventually heard his panic cries and came to pull him out.

"That was the last snow well that I ever dug," he wrote.

The life that was saved that day came to wield great influence for this county in Quebec City and beyond.

Growing up in those early days carried many risks and Alister Somerville suffered Scarlet Fever at age 5. He also had polio which created post polio syndrome in his later years.

He survived another encounter with his father at a farmhouse door in Havelock. Their carquiton them around 10 p.m. so they knocked repeatedly on the door until a voice from upstairs replied "Who are you? What do you want?"

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Alister Somerville remained active at his home office. In 1985 he published "Hemmingford Then and Now" and two years later he produced "Huntingdon ounty & Town."

Shock of murder touches community

A Valleyfield woman was shot to death outside her apartment last Friday evening by her recently estranged boyfriend who then killed himself as Valleyfield police were about to apprehend him.

The woman was Christine Deslauriers, 35, mother of two daughters and secretary to the director general Guy Rho of the Barrie Memorial Hospital.

The dead man was identified as Robert Tremblay of St. Lazare.

"Hardly can believe this has happened Christine." Mr. Rho remarked the staff who worked closely with her are having a difficult time to walk past her vacant desk. It has shocked the office and the hospital community which number about 200 part-time and full time employees.

The course of her job brought her into contact with most of the staff and she was also a key figure in Foundation and Corporation board projects. In her professional capacity she often acted as a liason between the hospital and the public. She did much more than only a secretarial job, he commented. In 1989 she worked closely on the hospital's 50th Anniversary celebration. It would have been four years this Friday that she would have been working at the hospital. "Really a tragic loss, and it will take time to fill her role and to recover from all of this."

While she worked closely with her fellow employees, she did not disclose her personal life. No one at the hospital foresaw this possibility. The turn of events in her private life occurred very suddenly. She left work that Friday evening at 4:30 p.m. The only observation made by an associate is that she seemed a "bit upset."

The newspapers have been full over the weekend with the grim details of her tragic end. The stories are having a real affect on the hospital community. But it is likely her young daughters who will feel the most pain from all of this, he remarked. (V.F.)


