Erle C. Martin

Prominent local citizen dies in Huntingdon at 95

A prominent citizen and long-time Huntingdon resident, Erle C. Martin died on June 19, 1993, in his 95th year.

He was born on a farm near Dewittville on October 17, 1898, and had lived in Huntingdon since 1926 when he established his law practice. Many will remember visiting his office on King St. He retired in 1975 after a law career which spanned nearly 50 years.

Erle attended Ormstown High School and graduated with B.A. and B.C.L. degrees from McGill University in 1923, after temporarily interrupting his education to enlist in the 1st Canadian Tank Battalion. He served overseas in 1918 and was on of the few remaining World War I veterans in the area.

Always involved in the affairs of the Town of Huntingdon, Erle served as Secretary-Treasurer for 34 years and for 16 years was Secretary of the Huntingdon Protestant

School Board. He was a charter member of the Rotary Club, which honored him with a Paul Harris Fellowship, and until recently was an active participant in club events.

Another of Erle's many interests was the Legion. As a charter member of Huntingdon Branch #81, he was an enthusiastic attendant at many of the

branch functions. He was also a member of Chateaugay Lodge and of Huntingdon Church where he had served as an Elder and Steward.

Erle was an avid sportsman who played baseball, hockey, tennis, badminton and lawn bowling in the early days. For 45 years he was an active curler whose greatest thrill was playing third on the Huntingdon rink which represented Quebec in the 1942 Brier. In later years he took up golf and was a member of the Malone Golf Club until past his 90th birthday.

Erle was always interested in politics and ran as a Liberal candidate in the 1948 provincial election.

Erle was married for over 50 years to Ruby Davidson who predeceased him in 1979. They had two daughters, Carol Carr of Deep River, Ont. and Marilyn O'Regan of Bridgewater, New Jersey. Erle is also survived by five grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Obituary

Ormstown native, 71, dies in Vermont road accident

A Tribute to
Archibald Douglas Moe
January 25, 1922-
June 7, 1993

Friends and relatives were saddened to hear of Archie Moe's untimely passing. The Ormstown native and his wife Nancy were returning to Massachusetts from a weekend in the Ottawa area where several former air-crew members met their R.C.A.F. pilot Russ MacKay. Just south of Montpelier, Vt., on a super highway, for unknown reasons, their vehicle left the road, went over the embankment, and landed in a gully. When discovered, the were still fastened in their seat belts in the wreckage. Archie was dead and Nancy unconscious with multiple fractures.

He was the son of Charles Moe and Ellen McMartin. A sister Eleanor (Mrs. B. Cairns) predeceased him in 1975.

Educated in the Ormstown school, he was known as an avid reader, very interested in literature, history and French.

He was also a keen hockey player and involved in Scouting. An-

other of his interests was poetry, which he could read and recite to perfection

Shortly after graduating from O.H.S., he joined the R.C.A.F. and served till W.W.2 ended. He had the distinction of being in the final bombing mission over Europe, and took part in the now controversial raid on Dresden, Germany.

Those familiar with Russ Mackay's "One of the many" will recall their plane was badly shot up on that last tour and that by pure chance they located a tiny air strip in France and landed safely. Emergency repairs were made fuel provided and the crew made it safely back to England.

Following his discharge in 1945, Archie married Nancy Hollister of Greenfield, Mass., and soon after was employed as a linesman with the Hydro Co. For a time the couple lived and farmed in Colrain, Mass. Then a promotion to foreman took them to W. Springfield where they maintained a fine home. Archie took great pleasure in his lawn, flower beds and vegetable garden and tended them in professional manner.

After an early retirement Archie was able to devote considerable time to his church and took up woodworking as a hobby.

His outgoing personality and happy disposition made him a host of friends. One of his happiest times was spent at last summer's O.H.S. class reunion.

Besides his wife Nancy, he leaves daughters Pamela, and Eleanor; sons Charles, Andrew and Archie; and several grandchildren. All regret his passing yet rejoice in having had such a good friend.

A memorial service was held June 12, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, West Springfield when mourners filled it to capacity. Following the celebration of Life, friends, neighbors and relatives gathered at the Moe home.

It is appropriate to conclude this tribute with lines used by Sir Wm. Gilbert as his farewell to long-time friend and associate, Sir Arthur Sullivan;

"Is life a boon?
If so, it must befall
That Death, when 'e've
he call
Must call too soon".
