Obituary

Railroad legend John Fox, 77, spent early years in Huntingdon

John Fox, a legend in Canadian railroad history who grew up in Hunting-don, died April 13 in Calgary, Alberta. He was 77.

Son of James Fox who came from En-gland to Huntingdon and operated a store here, John Fox attended Huntingdon Academy and later joined the Royal Canadian Air Force as a pilot in World

War II . After the war, he studied Civil Engineering at McGill University and married the former Janet Fraser of Dundee in 1949, the same year that he joined the CPR.

Moving to Calgary in 1982, John Fox was the CPR executive in charge of over-

seeing construction on the Mount Macdonald Tunnel through Rogers Pass, at North America, which opened in 1989. The project also included the 1.85 km Shaughnessy Tunnel and a 1,229-metre bridge named after Fox himself. He has been described as "one of the great railroaders of all time" by a CPR

14.66 km the longest railroad tunnel in
